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

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RULES

- A. The Society shall be called the **KINGSWOOD WALTON & TADWORTH HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY**.
- B. The objects of the Society shall be the promotion of Horticulture and kindred subjects by way of shows, talks, social functions etc.
- C. The Officers of the Society shall consist of President, Vice Presidents, Chair, Secretary, Treasurer and a Committee of nine with power to co-opt five to form a quorum and shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting. Any vacancy occurring in the Officers or Committee may be temporarily filled by the Committee.
- D. The financial year of the Society shall end on 31st July and the Annual General Meeting shall be held not later than 31st December, at which the books and accounts shall be open for inspection.
- E. An Extra-Ordinary General Meeting may be called by the Committee at any time or shall be called on the receipt, by the Secretary, of a requisition by 20 members stating the reason for wishing the meeting.
- F. A minimum of 14 days' notice shall be given to members of all General Meetings.
- G. Any person or organisation may become a member of the Society on payment of a minimum subscription of £4 or Joint £7.50, which will include free admission to all shows.
- H. The funds of the Society shall only be used in connection with the objects of the Society and shall be lodged in a bank account in the name of the Society and shall only be withdrawn on the joint signatures of the Treasurer and one of the two members of the Committee appointed for the purpose.
- I. Any addition, alteration or amendment to the Rules of the Society shall only be made at a General Meeting and if approved by a majority of the members present.
- J. Any dispute arising under Show Regulation 15 to be dealt with by a sub-committee consisting of three committee members and one Officer to preside.
- K. The Committee shall have power to deal with any matter not provided for in the Rules.

SHOW REGULATIONS

*Exhibitors not complying with these Regulations will be liable to disqualification.
The Committee's decision shall be final in all matters not specified herein.*

ELEGIBILITY OF EXHIBITORS:

1. All sections are open only to members, unless otherwise stipulated.
2. Entries must be returned to the Hon. Show Secretary by email or by telephone, no later than the Wednesday before the Show.
3. No exhibitor may make more than one entry in any class.
4. All horticultural exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitor in his or her own garden or allotment for a period of not less than two months previous to the date of the Show and the Committee reserve the right to satisfy itself, by a visit or otherwise, that this is the case. Any exhibitor in breach of the regulation will be disqualified from receiving any prize at the Show and, at the sole discretion of the Committee, may be debarred from exhibiting at any future Show.
5. The Committee reserves the right to refuse an exhibit and to debar anyone from exhibiting who in its judgement is ineligible; and also to decide in which sections exhibitors may enter.
6. Exhibits must be staged during the times given at the head of each Show Schedule.
7. **Exhibitors must leave the hall by 10.45 am on the morning of the Show once they have staged their exhibits.**
8. Class cards will be supplied for each exhibit and exhibitors are responsible for placing these face downwards by the exhibit to which they refer. The cards will be reversed when judging is completed.
9. Vases and/or plates will be provided for Horticultural Classes, unless otherwise stated and no other containers will be accepted.
10. Exhibitors are requested to name their exhibits where possible. Suitable labels will be provided. Errors in naming or failing to name will not disqualify.
11. After judging has taken place, no exhibit or part of an exhibit may be altered or removed until after presentation of awards, without the consent of the Hon. Show Captain.
12. Two or more persons may not compete separately in the same class with produce from the same garden or allotment. If members wish to make joint entries, exhibits should be entered in joint names.

JUDGING:

13. Horticultural classes will be judged according to the Rules of The Royal Horticultural Society, except those for Chrysanthemums, Dahlias, Delphiniums, Roses and Sweet Peas, which will be judged according to the rules of their respective Societies.
14. The decisions of the Judges will be final subject to Regulation No 15. The Judges may withhold any prize if, in their opinion, the exhibits are not of sufficient merit and will disqualify any exhibit that is not strictly according to Schedule.

15. An exhibitor who considers that an award had been incorrectly given because the exhibit is not in accordance with the Schedule, or considers that he/she has been incorrectly disqualified may lodge a protest in writing with the Show Captain or the Secretary up to 4 pm on the day of the Show or 9.30 pm at an evening show. The protest must be accompanied by a deposit of 30p which will be returned, if the protest is upheld.
16. The Judges will regard correctness and clearness of naming as telling in favour of an exhibit in a close competition.
17. Only authorised persons are allowed to be present while judging is in progress.

PRIZES:

18. Prize winners are expected to receive their prizes in person. Prize money not collected from the Treasurer within 14 days reverts to the Society's funds.
19. No money prizes will be awarded where a prize in kind is offered, except in the case of a Cup or Trophy, but in all cases the value of the prize in kind will not be less than that of the appropriate money prize. The committee reserves the right to substitute a prize in kind for any money prize.
20. Points for awards will count as 3 for First, 2 for Second and 1 for Third, except in the following cases:-

21. Winners of all Cups and Trophies will hold them for one year and return them in a clean condition to Jasmine Heath, 36 Tadorne Road, Tadworth (Tel: 01737 812491) not less than eight weeks before the corresponding show the following year. They are insured by the Society, but holders are expected to keep them in a clean condition free from damage. In the event of any damage occurring, it must be reported immediately to the Secretary. Cups may be engraved by the winner at their own expense.

ADMISSION TO SHOWS:

22. Members are admitted free in accordance with Rule G.
The price of admission is: Adults £1, children (under 14) free at all Shows.

LIABILITY FOR LOSS:

23. The Committee will take every reasonable care, but all exhibits, personal property etc. shall be at the risk of the exhibitors and the Society shall not be liable for compensation for loss or damage from any cause whatsoever.

Should a Show for any cause not be held, no exhibitor shall have any claim on the Society. Exhibitors will be wholly responsible for any claim made by their employees.

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SHOW NOTES

GENERAL

Throughout the Schedule the words, kinds and cultivars are used in the following sense; Roses and Dahlias are different kinds of flowers, 'Peace' and 'Felicia' are different cultivars of roses.

ANNUAL – a plant which grows from seed and which naturally and ordinarily flowers, seeds and dies (irrespective of frost) within twelve months.

HORTICULTURAL

Exhibits should be named where possible, as it helps to make the shows more interesting. Furthermore, in a close competition, correct naming will tell in favour of an exhibit.

NB: No buds on roses.

Flowers should be fresh and free from damage due to weather, pests, disease and faulty handling.

Vegetables should be clean, fresh, tender and free from blemishes and should be properly prepared for exhibition. Roots should be washed clean (use a sponge and not a brush).

All fruit should be ripe and free from blemish. (Tomatoes are a fruit). Its appearance is enhanced by the preservation of its natural bloom.

Apples should not be polished.

Black, Red and White Currants should be shown in bunches as grown.

Other soft fruit should be shown on the stalk.

FLOWER ARRANGEMENT

Exhibit: Plant material with or without accessories.

Figurine: One figurine or group of figurines of any material appearing as one entity. This may be part of the container or used separately.

Accessory: A figurine, candle, ornament, plate, stones or shells, drape or any object or non-plant material used as part of, or apart from, the arrangement. Accessories may always be included, unless specifically forbidden by the Schedule.

Drape: Piece of material placed behind an arrangement.

Base: Can be wood, metal, fabric etc. on which the container stands.

Container: Can be anything at all which will hold plant material, but these must be in water or water retaining material.

Vase: Any container the height of which is greater than the top diameter.

Bowl: May be any shape and must have a diameter greater than its height.

Space: No part of an exhibit may extend beyond the given space whether or not a niche is provided. On the other hand, an exhibit may be penalised for being too small for the space allowed.

DOMESTIC

Preservation: Branded bottles, jars and/or lids must not be used.

Twist-off lids may be used for jams and preserves but **not** screw top lids. It is always recommended to use a wax disc when using cellophane covering on a jar of Jam, Jelly or Marmalade. If using a plastic covering held with a rubber band, use clear (no pattern) cellophane and not 'cling film' type products.

All Jam, Chutney and soft drinks must be labelled with name of contents and date made, ie: day, month and year). Jars must be filled to the top. Stickiness and finger prints may be removed from the outside of bottles and jars by cleaning with a little methylated spirit and polishing with a soft cloth.

Lemon (or Orange) Curd must have a wax disc and cellophane cover.

Chutney and Pickles must be at least three months' old. The jar must have a new vinegar proof twist top and no wax disc is needed under this.

Soft drinks must be in a clear glass or plastic screw-top bottle; 500 ml. approx.

Cookery:

Make sure the cake tin is the size stated in the recipe.

Cherries are not a dried fruit and must not be used if the recipe asks for dried fruit. A help in stopping glaze cherries from sinking in cakes is to cut them in half, wash and dry them well, and then add them to the weighed flour.

It is always correct to glaze puff pastry. Shortcrust pastry which is used for fruit pies must not be glazed, but a little sugar may be sprinkled on when cooked.

Recipes:

In some classes the recipe printed in the Schedule must be used – this will be clearly indicated.

JUNIOR SECTION:

Open to those under 15 years of age. Classes will be judged for two age ranges, ie: age 8 years and under; age 9 – 14 years. No entry fees.



RECIPES

LEMON DRIZZLE CAKE

225g unsalted Butter, softened
225g Caster Sugar
4 Eggs
225g Self-raising Flour
1 Lemon, zested

For the Drizzle topping:

1½ Lemons, juiced
85g Caster Sugar

- Heat the oven to 180 °C / 160 °C fan / Gas mark 4
- Beat together the Butter & Caster Sugar until pale and creamy, then add the Eggs, one at a time, slowly mixing through
- Sift in the Self-raising Flour, then add the Lemon zest and mix until well combined
- Line a loaf tin (8 x 21 cm) with greaseproof paper, then spoon in the mixture and level the top with a spoon
- Bake for 45-50 mins until a thin skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean
- While the cake is cooling in its tin, mix together the Lemon Juice & Caster Sugar to make the drizzle
- Prick the warm cake all over with a skewer or fork, then pour over the drizzle – the juice will sink in and the sugar will form a lovely crisp topping
- Leave in the tin until completely cool, then remove and serve.

[NB: Will keep in an airtight container for 3-4 days or freeze for up to 1 month.]

BARA BRITH (*Makes 1 Loaf*)

450g Strong Bread Flour
1 tsp. Mixed Spice
50g Butter
½ tsp. Salt
125g Light Muscovado Sugar

300g Mixed Dried Fruit
Finely grated Zest & Juice of 1 Orange
1 Sachet of fast-action Dried Yeast
175 ml. Milk
1 Free Range Egg

- Sift the Flour & Mixed Spice into a large mixing bowl
- Rub in the Butter; stir in the Salt, Dried Fruit, Orange Zest & Yeast
- Make a well in the centre of the dry ingredients and pour in the Orange Juice
- Beat in the Eggs & Milk together and pour into the centre of the dry ingredients
- Mix to form a soft dough
- Turn out onto a lightly floured surface and knead until smooth
- Place in an oiled bowl and cover loosely
- Leave in a warm place until doubled in size
- Grease a 900g loaf tin
- Turn the dough out onto a flour surface and gently knead
- Shape into a log the same length as the tin
- Place the log into the tin, loosely cover and leave for a further 30 – 40 mins
- Bake in a preheated oven 200°C / Gas mark 6 for 40 mins. until golden
- Turn out the loaf and tap the bottom (it will sound hollow when cooked)
- Cool on a wire rack
- Serve sliced and spread with Butter.

BOILED FRUIT CAKE

| | |
|---|--------------------------------|
| 450g / 1lb. Mixed Dried Fruit | 2 Medium Eggs |
| 115g / 4 oz Margarine | 225g / 8 oz Self-raising Flour |
| 200g / 7 oz Light Brown Sugar | 1 tsp. Mixed Spice |
| 150ml. / ¼ pint Cold Water / Orange Juice | 1 tsp. Cinnamon |

- Put Fruit, Margarine, Sugar & Water (or Fruit Juice) in a pan and bring to the boil
- Leave the mixture to cool. Pre-heat oven to 150 °C / Gas mark 2
- Grease and line a round cake tin (size approx. 17½ cm (7")
- Beat the Eggs into the mixture first and then beat in the Flour & Spices
- Put mixture into the cake tin and bake for about 2½ – 3 hours or until cooked.

[Hint: To prevent burnt edges, tie brown paper to the outside of the cake tin.]
